Rochester Public Library (RPL) celebrated Library Card Signup Month by roasting marshmallows at a special kickoff event on August 31st. Over 350 people attended the event, and learned how to "Get S'more" with a library card.

"Libraries are more than just books today, and the Rochester Public Library embraces that philosophy," says Head of Marketing and Community Engagement at RPL, Karen Lemke. "In recent years, our patrons have said they are interested in experiences and connecting with others as part of how they learn and grow."

Library Board Continues to **Explore** Options By Karen Lemke

The Rochester Public Library board is keeping their options open when it comes to future building needs.

On Wednesday, September 21, board members discussed proposed а Memorandum Understanding of (MOU) with the University of Minnesota Rochester, the Minnesota Children's Museum of Rochester, and the Rochester YMCA. In the end, board members voted against signing the MOU, but directed staff to continue conversations with the MOU partners as part of a greater investigation into possible options.

"A possible partnership with UMR is one of multiple options we could pursue," says Library Board President Lou Ohly.

The original design of the library called for three stories, but was cut back to two stories following a sales tax cut in the early 1990s. Now over twenty years old, the lack of programming space in the library hinders RPL staff when it comes to educational and cultural programming and exhibits.

The demand for library programming has risen dramatically since 2012, when the library's community-driven strategic plan was written to include more programming opportunities. "We listened to the community, and as a result our program attendance skyrocketed," says Library Director Audrey Betcher.

Earlier this year, the Rochester City Council supported a 2-story expansion of the library, but the project stalled while board members searched for additional funding for the project. The library board, under Rochester's Home Rule Charter, is responsible for making decisions about the library building and location.

At Wednesday's regular meeting, the board directed a planning subcommittee to map out how to move forward.

"We know we still have this problem of not enough space for the community," says Ohly, "so we need to keep researching our options."

Now Showing: DVD Checkout System Improves

The library is gearing up for a blockbuster season of film checkouts, with changes in how movies are stored and checked out.

"It's going to be a much simpler process," says Circulation Services Manager Andy Stehr. "We've updated our system to allow for a better checkout experience."

For the last decade, RPL has used a system called Lock-A-Shelf (LAS) to house movies and television series. Having the LAS helped to prevent the loss of DVDs, but it also caused a few challenges. The system could be confusing, and the shelving units for LAS are larger than standard shelving for DVDs. With the DVD collection expanding over the last

decade, and the library without room to expand the LAS, many films had to be kept in a back area of the library.

"Patrons couldn't access hundreds of titles on their own," says Stehr, adding, "They had to track down a staff member if they wanted something "from the back.""

How does the new process work? The library is implementing radio-frequency identification (RFID) tags attached to items, including the 48,000 DVD titles. The DVD cases are locked, but patrons will be able to unlock them on their own after checking them out. Stehr says it's still a new process so there might be some challenges at first, but staff members and volunteers will be on hand to answer questions and help make the transition easier.

"The biggest change patrons will notice is the ability to access DVDs and check them out faster. In the past, locked cases could only be unlocked at the public service desk. This new system lets patrons do that on their own," says Stehr.



You may now unlock your own DVDs and CDs with new unlockers.

Each self-check station now has an unlocking device for patrons to use.



Books on the Fly Lands Successfully By Sam Edge

"Your adventure starts here ... "

These words grace the door of the mini library installed at the Rochester International Airport.

When Rochester Public Library and Rochester International Airport staff, along with support from the Friends of the Rochester Public Library and the Minnesota Department of Education through a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, launched the Books on the Fly pilot in March, they had no idea the adventure they would be embarking on as well!


The Books on the Fly pilot consists of both a physical mini library and an electronic PowerTower kiosk that allows users to access Rochester Public Library's wealth of electronic resources at the Rochester International Airport in the main terminal. Library staff and community partners wanted to place these items at the airport in order to extend the reach of the library into the greater community and to help fill a need for reading material at the Airport. RPL and RST staff have worked together closely since the launch of the pilot in March in order to ensure the mini library is well stocked and that the electronic kiosk functions without incident.

The Books on the Fly program has been a success, with usage of both the PowerTower kiosk and the mini library observed. Although library staff and partners initially predicted travelers might be more receptive to the electronic kiosk, they have instead found the mini library to be more popular. The mini library has already exceeded its goal of circulating 500 items by the end of August, with a current total of 616 items circulated. The library has received 111 paper survey responses from the mini library, many brimming with positive comments. "Every airport should have one!" and "What a great idea!" are two comments frequently seen on survey cards. Library staff have been




pleasantly surprised by the positive response to the Books on the Fly pilot, and have learned that travelers – just like everyone else – enjoy a good read.

The success of the Books on the Fly pilot is just another example of how the Rochester Public Library continues to meet community needs through collaboration and innovation. It is a reminder that when you support RPL, you support your community as a whole.

Libraries Change Lives: Dan Rengstorf, "The Piano Man"

"If you don't have a library card, you're doing yourself a disservice," says Dan Rengstorf, a.k.a. "The Piano Man" in Rochester. "And if you have a library card, but don't ILL, you're doing yourself an even greater disservice."

Rengstorf is a fan of ILL, aka interlibrary loan, which allows library patrons to borrow items from libraries throughout the state and even in the region.

"I've gotten books about music and different genres, but I especially enjoy books about musicians," says Rengstorf, adding, "It's handy to have anecdotes about the songs I am playing."


He's been using the service for over 20 years, becoming a wellknown patron at the Reference Desk. "The staff all know me by name," he quips, "and they're probably sick of me."

For several decades now, Rengstorf has been playing solo piano at various Rochester locations. He even served as the house pianist at the Kahler Hotel in the 1980s and 1990s.

With a degree in music and years of experience, he says he enjoys researching his craft, and couldn't do it without the Rochester Public Library.



Interlibrary loan (ILL) allows RPL to request materials from dozens of Minnesota libraries. While RPL has over 400,000 physical items (books, CDs, or DVDs), there are occasionally items that cannot be found locally. In addition to accessing titles from Minnesota libraries, RPL also participates in the Worldshare interlibrary loan network, allowing patrons to borrow materials from other states and Canada.


