Library Earns National Recognition By Karen Lemke

Rochester Public Library is one of 30 finalists for this year's National Medal for Museum and Library Service.

In a national press conference earlier this spring, Dr. Kathryn K. Matthew, Director of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) announced the finalists, which are chosen because of their significant and exceptional contributions to their communities.

"Knowing we are included within the top 30, out of thousands of institutions nationwide, is a great honor," says Library Director Audrey Betcher, adding, "In 2012, representatives from throughout Rochester and Olmsted County participated in the library's strategic planning process which led to an increased focus on inclusivity, innovation and creativity." The 2012 plan called for an increase in opportunities for residents to feel welcome, connected, inspired, and creative, which led to a dramatic rise in program attendance. In that time, attendance at library programs, classes and events increased 304% "We listen to our community," says Betcher, "and the increase in attendance speaks volumes."

Out of the 30 finalists, 10 will be chosen to receive National Medals at a ceremony in Washington, D.C. In the 23-year history of the National Medal, only two Minnesota libraries have received the honor: St. Paul Public Library (2005) and Hill Museum & Manuscript Library (2011).




Summer Playlist

Experience Rochester this summer with the library's new "Summer Playlist."

This all-ages program will encourage participants not only to read, but to experience new activities and explore the world around them. Head of Youth Services, Heather Acerro, says the "Summer Playlist" is a revamped summer reading program designed for children, teens, and adults. "In the past, our summer program was focused on children and teens. But this year's program is designed for the whole community."

All ages will be encouraged to try new things, explore, connect, create and even design their own goals. Participants will track their progress using the library's "Summer Playlist" log, available early June through August. "There are 'activities' for all ages to try," says Acerro, adding, "For example: four-leaf-clover-hunting for kids, screen-free days for teens, and bird-watching for adults."



As they complete the program, participants will receive gifts such as a free book, canvas book bag and opportunities to win raffle prizes.


Tutoring Program Garners Support

Rochester Reading Champions continues to make a difference in Olmsted County by providing one-on-one tutoring to struggling readers. Earlier this year, the Valley of Rochester Scottish Rite Children's Foundation offered a matching grant opportunity. For every dollar raised in the month of February, they offered to match, up to \$5,000. Community members responded to the challenge by donating \$6,075 to the program.

Other organizations have also been extremely supportive this past year. In late 2016, the library was presented with a \$7,000 check from the Rochester Area Foundation to support the program. The donation will be used to train volunteers and provide tutoring to older students.

The program has also received support to help younger students. A \$15,600 grant awarded in mid-2016 from United Way of Olmsted County is helping provide additional tutoring for children and youth.

Program Coordinator Gail Harris says the local support demonstrates how the community values literacy. "We see the impact RRC makes on the individuals who struggled with

reading prior to beginning the program," she says, adding, "and we know none of it would be possible without our supporters."

An impressive 100% of RRC students have made progress in their reading skills by participating in the program.

Hotspot & Chromebooks


Being connected to the digital world is a bit easier for RPL patrons with the recently-launched Wi-Fi Hotspot program.

The new initiative, sponsored by the RPL Foundation, provides hotspots for checkout to library patrons, allowing them access to mobile broadband. In Olmsted County, only 58% of residents have access to broadband, which can make applying for jobs or doing homework a difficult task.

In the program's first few months, the response has been extremely positive. Circulation Services Manager Andy Stehr says he knew the program would be popular, be he's still a bit surprised at the demand for the devices.

Within the first few weeks of offering the service, the demand outpaced the supply. At one point, the list of holds on the 30 "regular" hotspots (those that check out, for free, with a library card) had 35 people waiting for them.

Meanwhile, the rental-type hotspot program is also picking up speed. "This is for individuals who need broadband access



on specific days, and therefore rent the device," says Stehr. The rental hotspot is \$5 per day and can be borrowed for a total of 90 days at a time. Stehr also says the rental service gained more popularity during Spring Break, "and we expect the same for summer break," he adds.

Survey Says...

Over 900 people participated in our Library Customer Survey this year, providing valuable insight into how the library promotes services and programs.

Regular library users said they value the library for themselves and the community as a whole, with 96% of library users saying they feel RPL is "valuable" or "very valuable" in their own lives, while even more (97%) feel RPL is "valuable" or "very valuable" to the community.


Getting to the Library

Construction projects in downtown Rochester will affect Rochester Public Library users over the next several months.

Work along 1st Avenue NE and SE between 1st Street NE and 1st Street SE will impact getting to the library and using the connected Civic Center Ramp. The projects started in April and will run through much of the summer. Patrons wishing to park in the Civic Center Ramp will have to enter from and exit towards 2nd Street SE as shown in the diagram. The construction work near the library could create delays during heavy-traffic hours. A few great work-arounds to remember:

- Free parking is available after 4:01 p.m. and on weekends, which tend to have less traffic
- The library bookmobile is available for pickups, holds, and drop-offs. It's also easy to find the bookmobile on our regularly-updated schedule: http://bit.ly/RPLbkmb

The Friends of the Library send books overseas to service members through a program called Operation Paperback

Greetings from the desert country of Qatar! We are four months into a twelvemonth deployment. We are a PATRIOT unit and our mission is to defend American and Coalition lives and assets from the threat of possible aerial attack. We spend our days in 24-hour shifts, rotating through three crews. Our sites are fully manned and ready to engage enemy threats within a moment's notice with surface-to-air missiles. When not at war, however, life at site can become somewhat...boring. That's why I reached out to organizations such as yours to provide my Soldiers with productive ways to entertain themselves and occupy their minds while on shift. There's nothing quite like getting absorbed in a good book, whether it be a novel, biography, historical account, or self-help guide. Many of my Soldiers did not consider themselves readers before I started to receive books from generous donors such as yourself and built a display of interesting books in plain sight where they could see them and pick whichever book caught their interest. At first the Soldiers were puzzled. "Sir, where are you getting these books from?" they would ask. I told them that nice people who cared about us donated these books so that we would have something productive and entertaining to do instead of sitting around playing on our phones.

It didn't take long to catch on. Every time I brought in a new package or books Soldiers would gather around curiously to see what kinds of books were inside. Nearly every day I'd notice a Soldier with a new book in his hand that I had unpacked from a box I'd received recently. Before long, our unit became known for our "library," and even Commanders from other units would come by and ask if they could pick up a book or two!

None of this would have been possible without people like you. I'm stunned and beyond touched that a total stranger would take the time out of his or her day to acquire, package and mail books using their own money so that people they've never met before could have something in their hands while on this long and lonely deployment and get away in their minds. People like me are told "thank you for your service" quite often, especially when we're in uniform. My response is always the same, and it is always sincere:

Thank you for your support.
