Digital Microfilm Scanner Makes Old News Like New



The ad above is from a May, 1918 Post and Record Daily (the Rochester newspaper before it was known as the Post Bulletin). This ad was viewed from a microfilm roll, digitally scanned, sent to an email address and then saved as a file to be used for this newsletter. Sound complicated? Not really.

Microfilm rolls contain tiny images of newspaper pages. Many days, weeks or even months can be on one roll. When loaded onto a viewer (reader/ printer) the newspaper articles become readable. For ten cents per page, articles can be printed from the viewer to the library's printer. The library's microfilm collection contains local newspapers dating to 1859 as well as the New York Times from 1960 - 2002 and the Wall Street Journal from 1987 - 2000.

One type of reader/printer available at the library is a digital microfilm scanner purchased with funds from the Carl and Verna Schmidt Foundation. A digital scanner can have film reels mounted in any direction, zoom in closer on articles than older readers and save film from damage by not using glass guides or hot bulbs. The equipment also works like a regular flatbed scanner, putting the articles in software where images can be cropped, enhanced, or cleaned up by removing lines from scratched film. Once an image/article is selected it can be printed, saved to a flash drive or emailed.

Still sound complicated? The library is offering a session on using the scanner several times during March. Registration is required for these classes. Register online through the library events calendar at http://evanced.info/rochester/evanced/ eventcalendar.asp or by calling 285-8002.

GovDelivery

Never miss a booksale or author program again! The library is now using GovDelivery, an e-mail notification system used by the City of Rochester, to alert you to coming events and current news. Foreign Language Collection @ the Library

Rochester Public Library has thousands of materials (such as books, magazines, and videos) in foreign languages. The adult foreign lanquage section is located on the 2nd floor and includes materials in Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Hindi, Hmong, Italian, Japanese, Khmer, Russian, Serbo-Croatian/ Bosnian, Somali, Spanish, Vietnamese, and other languages. In addition to the materials upstairs, the Children's section on 1st floor has books in languages including Spanish, Vietnamese, French, Somali, and more for younger readers.



Rochester Reads Kick-Off Program

A Portrait of Pakistan program was held at the library on Monday, January 28 to kick off the Rochester Reads 2008 events. Faraz A. Shaukat, a graduate student at the U of MN, talked about his life experiences in Pakistan and the US. He described the four major regions of the country and their differences and talked about general Pakistani statistics, history and current politics.
