
#### A Tale of Two Patrons:

Not infrequently, she also likes to tell jokes to (or even play pranks on) some of her librarian friends: and her infectious laugh is often heard-perhaps just a tad loudly-in the vicinity of the Reference Desk. 

As part of the Minnesota Sesquicentennial celebrations, the library received a book from the newlyformed Minnesota Supreme Court Historical Society. John Hunziker, Rochester Public Library Communications Manager, accepts the donated copy from John B Arnold, Attorney at Law with Dunlap & Seeger.

Testimony: Remembering Minnesota's Supreme Court Justices is a book of memorials and biographical information for past Minnesota Supreme Court Justices who are deceased. It includes all memorials originally published in Minnesota Reports until it ended publication in 1966, including those for Territorial Justices. It includes new memorials and biographical information for Justices who passed away after 1966.

Around 200 copies of this book were distributed to public libraries around the state. The Supreme Court Historical Society is considering whether to have a second printing of the book in order to make it available for sale to the general public.

# **Summer Tips from the Library**

Summer is a great time to be outdoors enjoying the beautiful sunshine. Here are some tips to keep safe this summer and still check off a few books from your reading lists.

#### Did You Know?

The library has three computers by the east windows on the first floor that have Office 2003 programs installed on them. Programs include: Word (for word processing), Excel (for making spreadsheets), Power Point (for creating slide presentations), and Publisher (for creating posters/graphics). There is also a scanner hooked up to one of the computers for scanning photos and documents and a printer nearby. These computers are available on a first come, first served basis.



Still have questions about our new Materials Handling System or never used it before? Check out our recent video on Youtube! This short video gives more information about the system and how to use it. http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=sHCck-eewF8 Remember: it doesn't work properly or efficiently unless the materials are placed in the machine one at a time with the barcode facing down. If you have any questions about whether your material was really scanned in, you can always check your online account as soon as you get home. The items that were scanned in properly move off your account immediately.

You can bring your used inkjet and toner cartridges to the library to recycle. If you're coming into the library, you can deposit your empty cartridges in the plastic bin just to the right of the main doors on first floor. If you would rather drive up, you can bring them to the drive-up area behind the library (on 1st Avenue SE) and drop them in the clear plastic bin to the left of the bookmobile garage door (next to the blue bin for Friends bookstore donations).
