Libraries Change Lives - Homework Help



Jevon Hanenberger, a 10th grader at John Marshall, has been struggling with math. "He is in a large class and one-on-one help is seldom available due to class size and time constraints. After-school help is not an option due to the bus schedule," says his step-father.

The family had been looking at a local program that offered one-on-one help but the cost would have had some serious financial implications to the family budget. They were mulling over how to make the numbers work as getting Jevon proficient in math was a priority.

Jevon's step-father is one of the library's evening security guards. As he was doing his rounds of the library he noticed that a couple of days a week he saw young people and adults talking and doing what looked like school work.

He stopped by the reference desk on the 2nd floor and learned about the Homework Assistance Program. He had not been aware of this free program offered by the library using volunteers from the community at large. Students can come to the library any Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evening, from 6:00 p.m. – 8:40 p.m., walk into Meeting Room B, and get help with any homework subject. He could not quite believe that the help for Jevon he believed he'd to have to pay for was offered for free in the building where he worked.

Since that evening Jevon has been coming to the library on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and working on his math. While his parents realize that Jevon can only catch up so much in the short time he has been coming to the library, "he's starting to get it," his step-father says. His grades have moved from failing to a strong C. The library volunteers take the time to explain why a math problem is the way it is and work with Jevon to figure out the answer. They are patient. He is looking forward to what he will learn next.

The Homework Assistance Program has changed Jevons's whole attitude. Jevon says, "It's hard wanting to understand and not being able to." Now he does.

Has your child ever brought homework to you asking for assistance and you look it over thinking, "I'm not sure I can help?" What if your work schedule doesn't allow you to be home when your child is doing homework? Whom does your child ask, then?

The Rochester Public Library has always been a place for students of all ages to turn for homework assistance. Through the generous support of the Rochester Public Library Foundation, the Rotary

Clubs of Rochester, and Charles and Barbara Withers, RPL has been able to expand support to students with Live Homework Help from Tutor.com. The service began on September 1st after months of planning and implementation.

So what is Live Homework Help? It is an online, on demand homework assistance program. It connects a student with a real tutor in a one-on-one session. Help in math, science, social studies and English is available for grades kindergarten through early college. The service is available from any internet

- tutor.com is an online service that connects students to trained tutors who will help with homework in the areas of Science, Math, Social Studies and English. Students from kindergarten 12th grade and even college introduction levels can log on 7 days a week from 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. The tutors communicate with students with an instant messaging type format and a drawing surface to help diagram those tricky geometry problems. - Homework Assistance Study Table is held in the library every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evening from 6:00 - 8:40 in Meeting Room B. Area volunteers provide individual assistance to students with specific questions regarding their daily homework assignments. Although all students in the community are welcome, the academic levels of students who attend are generally grades 4 - 12.


More Resources at the Library

We recently installed a scanner and the Microsoft Office 2003 programs (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, etc.,) on Adult Internet Computer A on the 2nd floor. If you need to use a scanner and/or Office programs while you're using the internet, you can request Internet Computer A when you sign up for your Internet reservation. If you don't need Internet access, there is another computer available on the 1st floor near the adult fiction section which has both a scanner and Office 2003 programs.

Now that the political season is in full swing, we have compiled a special list of Election 2008 Web links. There are links for checking out political facts, tracking campaign contributions, registering to vote in Minnesota, checking out the websites of this year's candidates, and much more. From the library website, click on the Reference & Magazines tab to access the Election 2008 web links page.

- Learn-A-Test (LearningExpress Library) is an interactive online learning platform that includes practice tests designed to help students with math, writing and reading comprehension skills for elementary through high school levels, GED, college entrance exams and much more. This valuable tool can be found on the library's website by clicking on the Reference & Magazines tab then clicking on the "Alphabetical List of Research Databases" link, then scrolling down to the "Learn-A-Test" option. While you're scrolling, make note of all the other databases available. There's everything from finding out who your great-great-great grandfather was, online encyclopedias, learning Spanish, to fixing cars.

Library Wins National Award



"We provide downloadable audio books, video, and music because it is a service that our community wants and values," states Kim Edson, Head of Readers' Services.

The Rochester Public Library has been chosen as a recipient of the 2008 Digital Pioneer award (the "Digies" award) from its digital partner – OverDrive.

The Digital Pioneer award is presented to OverDrive partner libraries that have shown excellence and leadership in delivering digital media to their community through successful collection development,

website management, promotion and community outreach.

The Rochester Public Library has consistently been a leader in offering its patrons access to information in new formats that are of interest to the community. A partnership with OverDrive was a logical choice to deliver 24/7 access to digital media. The Rochester Public Library has also maximized its use of the OverDrive digital platform by being a leader in offering local content and new formats as they have become available.

Kim Edson, Head of Readers Services at the Rochester Public Library says, "It is an honor to receive this national award. We provide downloadable audio books, video, and music because it is a service that our community wants and values. It is an extra bonus to be recognized by the library community as a whole who are acknowledging our library as being a leader in establishing best practices for offering digital collections."

The award was presented to the Rochester Public Library at Digipalooza '08, the International User Group Conference, July 26 in Cleveland, Ohio at the All-Conference Reception hosted at the House of Blues.

Some of the other winners of this year's Digies Award were the Boston Public Library, the Delaware County Library System, the Denver Public Library, the Greater Phoenix Digital Library, the New Hampshire State Consortium, the Wisconsin Public Library Consortium and the Southern Ontario Library Service.

accessible computer through the library's website. It is also available on any computer in the library. RPL has contracted for tutoring services from 4 pm - 10 pm seven days a week in both English and Spanish.

Who are the tutors? They are certified teachers, professional tutors, college professors, graduate and undergraduate students enrolled in accredited colleges and universities, and proven subject experts.

RPL worked very closely with the school districts in our service area: Rochester Schools (public and private), the Dover-Eyota School District, and Byron School District, and RCTC. Teachers have been informed about this new service and have received posters for their classrooms and program cards for recommending the service to students. Students

have received folders that highlight the program features, and most families have received a magnet for their homes. The library worked with the Rochester and Byron public school districts to mail a library card to students who didn't have one.

But it is really all about results. Are students using the program to succeed in school? Of course the program is in its earliest stages, but in the first 15 days of the program, 370 students used the service. Over 90% of those students said that the program is helping them improve their grades.

This program would not exist for the students of our community without your generous gifts. Thank you for supporting our community of learners!
