

Unusual and Special Books by Sylvie Nickel

The Friends of the Library's mission regarding books could be defined as stewardship -- responsible authority for processing donations in a way to obtain the best possible value for the Library.

How We Got Started

A surprising number of the thousands of books donated to the Library each year can be described as "unusual and special" (U&S). Back around the turn of the century—this century, that is--Carol Smyrk, co-manager of the Friends Bookstore at the time, and Dr. Randy Brown, a knowledgeable book collector and volunteer pricer for the Bookstore, realized that many of these books were even more valuable than could be featured on the Bookstore's Collectibles shelf.


And so, as an added feature of the RochesterFest celebration in 2001, they pioneered the Silent Auction of rare books. The star of that first auction was *Tarzan and the Forbidden City*, which sold for \$100 to a local collector who stopped by frequently to ensure he was still the high bidder.

Then came Maxfield Parrish: A stunning 1925 1st edition of *The Knave of Hearts* appeared amongst the donated books, and Carol & Randy realized it was VERY VALUABLE. The donor couldn't be identified, so the book was listed on eBay—and it sold for more than \$1200! Everyone was elated, and the Friends began seriously thinking beyond the bookstore and yearly sales. Against advice, in 2003 Carol sold a very battered 1st edition copy of Faulkner's *As I Lay Dying* for \$450 on eBay instead of allowing it to be tossed in the trash.

Al Dollerschell, Friends Board member and former RCTC librarian, began "rescuing" obscure and eclectic books from the sorting room and selling them via Amazon.com with increasing success.



The RochesterFest Silent Auctions continued through 2006, when Carol and Sylvie Nickel, who had now signed on to the "unusual and special" team, decided that offering the books just once a year was too limiting (not to mention that the follow-up work was a bit overwhelming). They began featuring their treasures along with the various Friends sales, but at a separate table with set "buyit-now" prices. And even then, many books needed to bring still higher prices from more specialized buyers than came to the sales.

So Sylvie also began listing some Unusual & Special books on Amazon--often attractively illustrated children's books that she hates to part with, but also deceptively modest-looking histories or memoirs. Recently, a plain-looking copy of *Frontier and Indian Life and Kaleidoscopic Lives*, a memento of the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Washburn, North Dakota sold for \$280 (appropriately, to a buyer from Bismarck).

Sometimes we've actively gone out to find buyers. When the Extraordinary Bookseller closed its doors and donated many boxes of military history books to RPL, we contacted the local Civil War and World War II roundtable leaders with a list for their consideration, and we filled a rack with "war" books" to display in the bookstore and at one of the special sales.

How Much Is That Book Worth?

Spotting a potentially valuable book is often a matter of intuition; age and condition aren't necessarily the key factors. We do research on various online Web sites to find just how unusual and special it is. If Amazon.com has many copies listed starting at \$.01, or if AbeBooks has 547 copies, then best it go to the bookstore. But if not too many books are offered for sale, then we read




the descriptions to see which best match our copy, consider local buying habits, and price accordingly. If the book is particularly eye-catching, we'll feature at one of the special sales; if it's not, we'll probably just sell online. Sometimes we must decide between a "slow dollar" and a "fast nickel" in pricing.


Now Available in a Showcase Near You...
