



Channel One is a local food shelf and regional food bank that serves Southeast Minnesota and Western Wisconsin with a mission to help feed people in need. Channel One has given us floor space for book shelves, which I fill with 100-175 books each week. I don't often see the clients selecting the books but today two young women were there while I was filling the shelves and

they were very excited to be able to choose books for their children. Seeing these moms, eager to get books for their children, was very gratifying. Channel One's Jennifer Woodford said there is an elderly couple that takes books with each visit to the food shelf. The husband has early onset Alzheimer's and remembers the authors, which books he has read, and which ones he still needs to read. Reading has helped with his therapy and memory. Channel One serves an average of 3400 households each month; 40% of those individuals are children.

Community Food Response is a private, non-profit organization founded in 1993 to meet the growing need of families to have a supplemental source of food. This program focuses on "rescuing" food from 19 different hospitals, hotels, restaurants, schools, and grocery stores that would normally be discarded at the end of the day and getting the food into

the hands of individuals and families who need it. Community Food Response is open on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Over 800 adults and children go to the basement of Bethel Church each week to pick up food. Books are delivered every other week or when I get a phone call saying books are running low.

The books for Channel One and Community Food Response come from various sources. Primary among them are:

- overstock of donated books to the Rochester Public Library
- former library books from the Rochester Public Library
- former library books from the Rochester Public Schools
- books that have been purchased through the Rochester Area Foundation by a private donor

I have been a member of the Friends of the Library for over 30 years and encourage you to belong, too. There are a large number of volunteer opportunities to support your library and your community. Another way to support the Friends of the Library is to donate your gently used books. These books are a valuable resource to us and they are a tax deduction for you.


New kid's stuff - endcap games



Friends donate \$50,000 to Library

The year 2009 wasn't a very good one for most people, economically speaking. However, it was a great year for the Friends of the Library.

The good fortune all starts with the community. Generous community members donate items (books, videos, computer software, etc.) to the library. Those items are then sorted by volunteers from the community. They sort the items into four different areas.

- 1. Items for library staff to review and maybe add to the library's collection. Last year the Friends gave the library \$196,575 worth of materials for the collection.
- Items for the Friends' Bookstore. From sales, the Bookstore was able to donate a check in the amount of \$50,000.
- 3. The Unusual/Special and online sales collection. These books are put in special sales during the year and are offered online.
- 4. The rest of the books go on the book sales that are held five times per year. These sales along with the Unusual/ Special sales and the Online sales amount to an impressive \$22,000.

Let's do the math:

Community Donation: \$196,575 Friends Bookstore: \$50,000 Friends of the Library: \$22,000

Grand Total: \$268,575

A huge thank you to the community for all the donated items and to the Friends for managing them.

Race: Are We So Different?

People are different. Throughout history, these differences have been a source of community strength and personal identity. They have also been the basis for discrimination and oppression.

The idea of "race" has been used historically to describe these differences and justify mistreatment of people and even genocide. Today, contemporary scientific understanding of human variation is beginning to challenge "racial" differences, and even question the very concept of race.

RACE: Are We So Different?, developed by the American Anthropological Association in collaboration with the Science Museum of Minnesota, is the first national exhibition to tell the stories of race from the biological, cultural, and historical points of view. Combining these perspectives offers an unprecedented look at race and racism in the United States.

RACE: Are We So Different? Is a traveling exhibition that is being hosted by Mayo Clinic and the Rochester Public Library as part of a cross-country tour of museums, science centers, and community areas. This exhibit will help communities understand what race is and what it is not, and will offer individual visitors critical tools to recognize race and racism in their own lives. The exhibit will be on display at the Rochester Public Library May 17 - Sept. 4.

RACE: Are we so Different? is produced by the American Anthropological Association, with assistance from the Science Museum of Minnesota. The exhibit was made possible by generous funding from the National Science Foundation and the Ford Foundation.

Second-floor arrangement before/during RACE exhibit

The RACE exhibit is, in a word, HUGE. It is a great undertaking getting everything in. Construction for this project begins on April 5. Walls will be constructed, some doors will be widened, and since the RACE exhibit will take the entire rotunda area on second-floor, there will be massive rearranging.

Meeting Room B on second floor will house the foreign language collection. The Non-fiction collection 101 - 301 will move to the stacks in front of the Administration Office. The VHS tapes that are currently there will be moving into staff areas. These items will still be available for check-out but you will not have the ability to browse them. You can still reserve these items and also ask at the Reference Desk for them. The oversized books will move to the top of the vertical file cabinets behind the internet stations. Current magazines and newspapers will move to the reading area to the left of the stairs. Circulating magazines and cassette tapes will move to the magazine room. You can still check them out, but you will need to ask at the window for them. CDs and CDROMs will move to where the holiday books are currently displayed and the holiday books will be in the stacks.

The library will not rent out the auditorium or Meeting Room A from May 17 - September 4 owing to the many programs that have been scheduled around the RACE exhibit and the library's need for room for its own meetings. We apologize for any inconvenience caused. We will be able to take room reservations again in July for reservations after September 4.

This arrangement will be temporary but we believe that having the RACE exhibit in the library will greatly compensate for the inconvenience. We are proud to host this exhibit and hope the citizens of Rochester and the surrounding communities enjoy this powerful and educational experience.
