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Kieran McDonnell's Eagle Scout Service Project for the Rochester Public Library

Two LEGO Storage and Display Carts for their "LEGO Fun @ Your Library" program -by Kieran McDonnell

I have loved playing with LEGOs my whole life and I wanted other kids to be able to play with LEGOs as well. Over a year and a half ago, I initially shared this project idea with the Rochester Art Center to see if they could use a "LEGO imagination station" for its education and summer camp programs focused on modular building (also known as building things with LEGOs). They liked the idea, but would not have space to store the cart that would hold and display the LEGOs.

From there, I was working to contact people from the Boys and Girls Club and other non-profits that help kids when I saw the Rochester Public Library flyer about a new program called "LEGO Fun @ Your Library". I attended this event with my Dad and I thought it was

really fun. However, the cart used to store the bins of LEGOs was an old library cart. I arranged a meeting with Heather Acerro, Head of Children's Services at the Rochester Public Library. She said the library received a grant for \$1000.00 to purchase LEGOs for their

program. I suggested making two LEGO storage and display carts for the library for my Eagle Project; one that would be used at the library and another that could be loaned out to other organizations or be transported for other events or even be put on a bookmobile. She asked me to come up with some designs of the cart using a similar size to the existing cart that would fit their existing plastic bins. After doing some research, I came up with a good design and made a ¼ scale model of the cart. I met with Ms. Accero again and she

really liked the model and thought it would be perfect

for their needs. She wanted a total of two carts, both painted in "RPL" blue with either a painted or decal logo. She also wanted casters with brakes and hard plastic pockets to hold LEGO magazines and printed instructions for small creations.

After getting unit and district approval, I met with my project coach, Mr. Mike O'Connell and he had some different ideas for my plan to increase stability and selection of materials. I priced all of the materials that I would need. I started asking for donations

from family and friends for the project. Once I had enough funds, I worked with Dan Bochmann at Kruse Lumber to get estimates on the wood materials for the project. He took my designs and instruction and came up with a good priced estimate for the

wood. I worked with Paula from Insty-Prints to get a commercial quality decal to affix to the carts based on an image of the RPL logo. Both Dan and Paula suspended their labor costs for those materials which saved the project a great deal of money. I was very thankful for their kind donation. I then purchased the other materials and supplies needed; casters, Lego tiles, handles, etc.

For all of the seven work sessions, I gave instructions on what needed to be done,

provided safety instructions as well as provided snacks and beverages.

The first session was measuring and marking the shelf and support boards. The second session was attaching shelf supports to the side and middle boards. The third session was assembling, gluing, and clamping the frames. My original plan for assembly that I discussed with my Eagle mentor was not going to work, so I needed to work with the adults at the session to find a different way to assemble the carts. My plan was to have helpers complete all of the gluing and then clamp the frames. The reason this would not work is that the biscuit joints and wood glue used would swell up and dry before we get a chance to clamp and square the frame together. Instead of gluing the whole frame together and then clamping, we glued them clamped the carts in sections. This seemed to work ok, but there was stress at the end getting the frames square as the glue was drying. This was the most difficult session to lead because there were many more people there and we were not following the original plan for the session.


The fourth session was sanding the frames. This session took longer than I thought and I needed to provide encouragement to the helpers to hang in there to get the job done. The fifth session was

priming and painting the frames. The sixth session was cutting and attaching the shelves and backs. I instructed my helpers to make sure all of the shelves and backs were square. It turned out they were not and needed to be trimmed individually which took a lot of time.

The seventh session was attaching the final components. I instructed my helpers to drill holes and attach the handles, attach the casters (two fixed and two swivel) for each cart, attach the six 10X10 inch LEGO plates to the top of each cart and affix the RPL decal logo. At the end everything looked amazing. However, it took lot longer than I thought. When I tried to move the finished carts around, it was hard to maneuver because the carts were very heavy. I made a decision to switch out the two fixed casters with two swivel casters on each cart, even though it was strongly recommended to use two fixed and two swivel casters for stability. The carts were heavy enough where that was not a concern and it makes it easier to be moved.

This project took 129 hours of volunteer help provided by 14 different people. I have received many great compliments on my project and I am very proud of it. A big thank you goes to the Rochester Public Library for giving me the opportunity to take my vision and let me make it a reality.







Smart Play Spot Opens

Where will you find a canoe, a farmer's market, a bookmobile and a post office all under the same roof? At the Rochester Public Library in Rochester, Minnesota! The grand opening of the Minnesota Children's Museum Smart Play Spot at Rochester Public Library on March 16th brought a number of families, community members and local politicians out to celebrate this vibrant early literacy play space.

The installation is the tenth of eighteen Smart Play Spots that will be installed across Minnesota by the museum. Rochester's Smart Play Spot was funded largely by the State of Minnesota, Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment, Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund, with matching funds provided by Rochester Public Library Foundation and Friends of the Rochester Public Library.

Audrey Betcher, Library Director, Ann Sand, President of the Rochester Public Library Foundation Board, Dianne Krizan, Minnesota Children's Museum President and Senator David Senjem all provided comments on the exciting day.

The Smart Play Spot at Rochester Public Library has been open only a short time, but it has already become a destination for area families. Children are asking parents to bring them to the library and when they arrive they never want to leave. The space is designed as a place for preschoolers and their grown ups to play, sing, read, write and talk together. Research shows that regular practice of these five activities will prepare young children to learn to read.



Senator Senjem made his picture book reading debut with an entertaining reading of Ezra Jack Keat's The Snowy Day for the preschoolers in the audience. A ribbon cutting and refreshments followed.
