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Wellness Corner Helping Provide Information to Make Healthy Choices

"I went to the Wellness Corner on a lark. What a surprise to find out I had high blood pressure. I was encouraged to visit a doctor and now I have it checked regularly." After a month of operation, there are several stories like this where library users lives have been changed by information obtained at "The Corner."

The Wellness Corner is an opportunity for the library to provide information in another format—the human format especially to underserved population, such as the homeless, or those who may have barriers to getting and understanding information to make healthy choices.

A recent report from the Mayo Clinic Center for Innovation says, "An individual's health is affected by much more than medical care." Social interaction, education, safety, shelter, food, transportation and financial stability all play determinative roles. Local professionals coming to the 'corner' bring their expertise in these areas so people can make healthy choices.





The Corner will be staffed in collaboration with many community partners. Current agency partners are:

The "corner" itself is a private consulting room for activities such as: non-invasive health screenings, career counseling, small business assistance. Partners will have access to other library spaces to hold classes or programs such as "Living with a chronic illness," "Fall prevention," or "Healthy eating." Partners may 'selfschedule' their times on a new library room scheduling software.



Susan Hansen - Winner of the Minnesota Library Association's 2013 "Above & Beyond" Award

We are pleased to announce that our fellow librarian has been awarded MLA's 2013 "Above & Beyond" Award! Below is the nomination letter submitted to MLA by Frank Hawthorne.

For 25 years, Susan Hansen has been the archetype of the best of our shared profession. Though she would modestly deny it, or shrug-off its significance, she is the kind of librarian who managers rely on for excellence, and who colleagues look to for leadership and quiet competence. While managing to effectively juggle family and faith commitments with those of her workplace, she has consistently taken the next steps in finding those professional niches which best complement her unique skills, and which have served to move our public library forward to new and better service destinations. Beginning back in the 1980's, Susan (as a largely self-taught automation "geek" who was often tapped for her skills outside of our department) took one of the lead roles in advancing our institution's miscellaneous computer systems into the modern era. At the same time, she began to reach out to a number of special community constituencies, and institutional collections to share her varied expertise and considerable energies. Were she only the type of caring individual she publicly presents, Susan Hansen would add value to public outreach at our busy reference desk.
