bands and Spiderman flip flops. Brody has been fascinated by superheroes since he was two, beginning with TV shows and coloring books. Listening to Brody, it seems that there are now many different colored costumes for Batman, and more bad people than when I was following superheroes. One that was mentioned in particular was Feline Felonies with Cheetah who looks like a cheetah. Brody described her as, "not nice, a bad girl." We went to look at the toys in the glass case but the display had been changed. The toys were actually the superhero collection of Andy Stehr, the Head of our Circulation Area, so we took Brody behind the scenes and into Andy's office so he could look at all of the toys. He could name them all.

Mom (Kelly) shared a cute story which she thought Brody might enjoy reading years from now. It was that magical time in the progress and growth of a child known as toilet training. Brody turns five at the end of September, and he and mom will be flying out to Seattle to visit his great grandmother for her 80th birthday. He told me, "Going to the library was the best part of my day." He is also enjoying all the books he brought home!"
