MONTHS AFTER WATER LEAK, REPAIRS AND CHANGES ARE HAPPENING

"Are you remodeling?" is a question often fielded by library staff, months after a water softener malfunction led to an overnight water leak, heavily damaging the Rochester Public Library.

Now, final repair work is happening in spaces throughout the library's central core. In the library's second-floor reference section, damage to hundreds of square feet of carpet forced staff to block off that area with a temporary wall of shelves and other furniture. Sara Patalita, Head of Reference Services, says the water damage forced many staff to relocate.

"We shifted staff into other areas, which forced us to close off the Computer Lab and group meeting spaces," explains Patalita. "But we see an end in sight and eagerly wait to 'get back to a new normal."

The "new normal" will actually be quite different, once all the work wraps up in the spring. According to Patalita, the forced rearrangement of the second floor led to a few suprising results.

"Right after the flood, we weren't sure how to reopen the second floor, so we actually moved our reference desk to the first floor, near the library entrance. When we did that, we found out that people liked having access to our trained reference staff."

The increased access to reference librarians led to a dramatic increase in the number of questions asked by patrons, and Patalita says that trend continued after the second floor reopened.

"In late October we moved back to the second floor, but with the damaged (continued on page 2)



carpet, we had to create a temporary reference desk," says Patalita.

She says in the months that followed, staff realized the value of being more accessible to patrons. So in addition to new carpet, the second floor will be rearranged, providing an updated look and feel to the reference area.

One other change: more public computers.

"The demand on our public computers continues to be high, as many people rely on the library as their only source for computer access," says Patalita.

JT Enger Construction is completing the majority of the

library's \$213,000 repair work, and the library is working with the city's insurance provider to cover those costs.

Library Director Audrey Betcher says that in addition to changing the layout of the second floor, other changes will also be noticeable.

"Our original wallpaper and paint was from the early 1990s, in shades of taupe and beige, but the replacement wallpaper and paint will bring in more color," says Betcher.

NEW STRATEGY? WELCOMING ALL TO CONNECT AND LEARN.

A new report from Wilder Research shows that Rochester-area residents are interested in being welcomed and connected in the community.

In late 2019, the library teamed up with Wilder to conduct a series of focus groups and key interviews to learn more about community needs.

Library Director Audrey Betcher says the report was key to informing the library's strategic planning team as they developed a new strategic plan. "Wilder's research demonstrates the need for greater community engagement, because without the input of local residents we can't provide the best resources to meet community needs."

A committee of community members, library board members, and representatives from the Rochester Public Library Foundation and Friends of the Library all worked alongside staff and facilitators from Wilder Research to finalize the plan, which was formally adopted in January.

"Our previous strategic plan led to innovative programs and services, which led to national recognition," says Betcher, crediting community members for providing input in the plan that led to the library's National Medal win in 2018.

The new plan focuses heavily on increasing equity within the community and fostering connections. "We are excited to see where this new plan takes the library, and more importantly, the community," adds Betcher.

ANNUAL MEETING **HIGHLIGHTS**

Over 70 Friends' members attended the 2020 Annual Meeting Luncheon in January to conduct the organization's yearly business and provide a recap of 2019 highlights.

Some key facts and figures:

- Friends' members reviewed and donated \$185.303 worth materials which were added to the library's collection or local mini-libraries
- The Friends' Book Store sold thousands of books and other items \$75.000 which provided support library programs services in 2019 and 2020
- Friends' Board Officers nominated and approved: John Hunziker-President, Lou Wagner-Vice President, Joyce Wenz-Secretary, and Phillip Nordquist-Treasurer

Guest speaker Al Dollerschell also shared his collection of figurines and the stories behind them. Dollerschell picked up the items at various locations from around the world over the course of several years.









SCHOLARSHIP MAKES IMPACT: PROGRAM RETURNS

When Michael Jones was awarded the first-ever Friends' Scholarship, he said he loved the work RPL does for the community, especially work to support LGBTQIA youth. One year later, Jones is continuing his employment at RPL, attending school at Rochester Community and Technical College (RCTC), and also volunteering with Rochester Pride.

"Before I received the Friends' Scholarship, I was genuinely worried that I would have to take a semester off to save up the money for my classes. Because of the award, I was able to keep on track with my program. I'll be graduating in June, and that wouldn't have been possible without the generosity of the Friends. I'm incredibly grateful."

The scholarship program continues to make an impact. This year the program will once again award a \$1,000 scholarship to any current part-time library employee.

Says Friends' Board President John Hunziker, "The scholarship program allows us to understand how the library impacts the lives of young people in our community, and also supports the education of a community member."
