


Lies My Teacher Told Me: Everything your American History Textbook Got Wrong by James Loewen

Funny in Farsi

by Firoozeh Dumas

The author came to the United States from Iran in 1972 at the age of seven along with her father, mother and brother. She recounts many humorous episodes that occur as the family learns about and adjusts to American culture and customs. In a


more serious vein she includes how the family fared being in the US during the Iran hostage crisis.

Ms. Dumas also gives the reader a glimpse of Iranian customs and middle class family life in pre-revolutionary Iran.

I enjoyed this book. It was interesting to read of one immigrant family's experiences portrayed in a very personal and often very funny manner. Funny in Farsi would be an excellent choice for Rochester Reads. Immigration is a timely topic today and this book would make a great starting point for valuable discussion about immigrant experiences, challenges, and US immigration issues in general.


Hot Lights, Cold Steel:

Life, Death and Sleepless Nights in a Surgeon's First Years By Michael J. Collins

Hot Lights, Cold Steel tells a story of what it was like doing 4-year surgical residency at the famous Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN. Dr. Michael Collins finds himself among other residents feeling inadequate and unprepared and as he says, "the dullest scalpel in the drawer". As he starts out his residency Dr. Collins is faced every day with difficult decisions that will ultimately change his patients' lives.

While reading this book I laughed out loud, I cried, but I always cheered Dr. Collins on for being determined, gracious and caring for every patient he saw. After I finished reading this book I gained a new found respect for what residents go through during residency...They do a lot of work with very little pay and lots of hours. This is a must read for anyone who wants to become a doctor or for the person that is already a doctor.

Lies My Teacher Told Me


Everything Your American History Textbook Got Wrong by James W. Loewen

The author examines twelve American History textbooks in depth. He takes several topics such as Columbus' arrival in America and the Civil

Rights Movement and gives them broader context. Loewen argues that the fact-based method of teaching history is boring for students and inadequate for teaching the drama and complexity of history.

I really enjoyed this book. I found it thoughtprovoking and disturbing. Loewen challenged my long ago learned facts of American history and made me examine how my children are now being taught. I believe the book will generate great discussion on such topics as understanding our history and improving public education.

Plainsong



Small town Holt, Colorado will become your home as you read Kent Haruf's Plainsong. This realistic novel has been described as a triumph of the human family. You can't help but care about the characters: teachers Tom Guthrie and Maggie

Jones, Tom's sons Ike and Bobby, teen Victoria Robideaux and the McPheron brothers. These unique individualists form a family in the best sense of the word. A sense of great love and caring shines through, even while dealing with serious life issues such as depression, single parenthood, and spousal abuse.

The title Plainsong evokes the concept of a simple melody. The novel presents a simple theme of "love thy neighbor" for its complex and compassionate characters. You will feel the warmth of unconditional love which is the human harmony of this resilient family that never gives up on each other.

Soldiers

Family tragedy starts this poignant story with a couple's devastation at losing their twin daughters. Unable to conceive more children of their own, Laura and Terry Sheldon later attempt to rebuild their family by becoming foster parents to a withdrawn African-

American ten year old. This story shares the continuing struggle for each complex character. Laura desperately tries to recapture the happy family life she once had. Terry, still grieving for his loss, feels ambivalent about the new edition to the family. Alfred is insecure and lonely in his solitary status as the only black child in an all white small town. Neighbors, Paul and Emily Herbert, take an interest in the Alfred and share with him a book about Buffalo Soldiers, an African American regiment from the late nineteenth century. Alfred's interest in the book, horses, and history provides a missing connection and gives hope to this struggling family.

The story's message of "it takes a village" makes this book an excellent choice for Rochester Reads. This heartwarming tale demonstrates the transformative power of books, the importance of knowing one's history, and has layers of depth that would lend itself to interesting community discussions.



Library to Join MnLINK – Interlibrary loan will get easier!

MnLINK is a state-funded organization that brings together library resources to make it easier for patrons to find materials for interlibrary loan. MnLINK runs software on the "MnLINK Gateway" that allows someone to search across many library catalogs in Minnesota. You can try it out at www.mnlink.org. Once we have been installed, the Rochester Public Library and the Rochester Public Library Bookmobile will be available pickup locations.

When you call up a title after searching the MnLINK Gateway, you can click on the "Get it" button which will request the item from the owning library to the pickup location of your choice.

The Rochester Public Library has been using a similar process since 2003, but this move will put us on the same system as the rest of the state.

We have been on the waiting list to be on MnLINK since 2002, so we are very excited about the official request to be part of the MnLINK Gateway.

We expect to be up on MnLINK this summer.
