From the Director — Merchandising update

The Friends got the library started on the road to merchandising. The Friends purchased an octagon display unit that has been sitting in the main lobby. With that success, the library has continued down the merchandising path.



I hope you've had a chance to see the changes that have occurred in the library since mid-February on the merchandising project. We are including one before and after picture so you can see the dramatic difference.



- The reading area on the second floor has been changed to take advantage of the beautiful view of the river. The magazines have been put in spinners to better utilize space.
- The octagon display purchased by the Friends has moved upstairs to display materials in the non-fiction collection. An identical unit was purchased to have additional areas to display.



- All new fiction and non-fiction has moved to the slat wall and is displayed face out
- Gondolas are in the main lobby area to attract the attention of those waiting in line to check out.
- The bank of computers has moved out of the center of children's. Someone commented to me this morning how much more light seems to be coming into the children's area. Octagons and gondolas are moving into the area to display new children's materials.
- The young adult area has new tables for the internet computers. They are bright and modern. Not only are they fun, but they improve line of sight for staff and they leave more room for displaying the collection.

We are already seeing a response to the changes. Kim Edson has been tracking new fiction circulation and in the first month we've seen a 13% increase in circulation.
