After the talk, he sold and signed copies of his books, from "Iron Lake" to "Thunder Bay."

Automation

You probably noticed the construction near the inside and outside book drop areas. The library has installed a new device to check-in library materials more efficiently. The Automated Materials Handling system scans barcodes on



the items being returned and automatically updates a patron's record. Another time-saving feature of the system is that items will be automatically sorted by type of material, such as children's, video, fiction, etc. This has been done manually. Before installation of the new system, it took up to four days to process books and return them to the shelves.

Volunteers will be available to help patrons learn to use the new system. Unlike the self-check system, patrons will need to learn to use this system as there will be no manual return site inside the building.

Winterfest Sale

Lucky for us, our Winterfest event was indoors! Many patrons and volunteers braved the subzero weather to make this year's sale a success.

At the end of the day we had made \$1152.25 in the auditorium. Add to that another \$167 from our special and unusual book ladies, Carol Smyrk and Sylvie Nickel, and we reached a grand total of \$1319.25. That's a lot of donations from a lot of people..

This sale went especially well thanks to the efforts of not only our volunteers, but also the Library staff who turned out in force to set up tables, move carts and set out books. Given our tight opening schedule, we could not have done it without their enthusiastic assistance. Thank you so much!

Have you noticed the Public Service desk has a new look? As part of our continuing effort to make the library a more inviting place, we are evaluating public desks in all divisions. The Public Service desk was changed first since it is the first desk that people

view as they come into the library. No specific plans or timelines are defined for other desks at this time. Some changes to the Public Service desk include:

- Defined work stations (for some the old desk was very confusing as to where to go.)
- Additional lower counter space (this is to make it easier to serve children and those in a wheelchair.)

- Displays for material (think of it as the library's equivalent to the candy at a retail checkout.)
- Narrowed the desk (the new desk literally brings staff and patrons closer as it's six inches thinner.)
- Ledges for people to set books and purses on.

The new desk configuration offers a more friendly and inviting first impression and it is more comfortable and efficient than the old desk for both patrons and staff.

Friends' Bookstore News

2007 was another banner year for the bookstore and its affiliated special sales. Roughly \$125,000 worth of donated books were added to



the Library's collection, either as new additions or replacement of worn books. The bookstore presented the Library with a \$45,000 check to be used for programming, acquisitions and other library needs. In addition, special sales raised over \$10,000 which the Friends use in support of programs such as Read With Me and Rochester Reads and for purchase and support of special equipment such as the genealogy program now available at the Library. Al Dollerschell raised an additional \$4,000 specialized donated books through Amazon. On-site sale of other special and collectible books gave the Friends another \$1000.

A guidelines booklet that should help clarify procedures for sorting books for the library, the bookstore and other sales has been complied. The booklet will be given to all new sorters and will be available as a reference to all others. Ask for a copy of the four-page document from either Carol Stucki or Helen Whitney McIver. A copy can be found in the Bookstore Binder.

Hope to see many of you at the National Library Week sale Sunday, April 13 from 1:30 to 4:30 in the Library

Auditorium.

Summer hours at the bookstore go into effect following Memorial Day weekend; since the library is closed Sunday, the store is also closed. Finding a State Poet Laureate

Minnesota now has its first official state Poet Laureate, and few poets can rival the accomplishments of Robert Bly! I hope you read or heard about this amazing author in recent news. Though we have had poets serve unofficially in this capacity in the past, last year Minnesota lawmakers passed legislation to make the position official. As a writer and insatiable reader of poetry, I was honored to serve on the statewide committee to select the Poet Laureate. Thank you, Friends, for nominating me for this amazing opportunity! (What a treat to read all that poetry, some of which was unpublished work by famous people!) The selection committee was intended to represent the breadth of the state of Minnesota. Eleven members represented various and Friends arts organizations.

More than 50 poets were nominated for the poet laureate, many of who had such impressive credentials it was hard to know where to begin. Each poet was evaluated on the quality of their poetry, their contribution to Minnesota's literary community and their perspective of the role of poet laureate. For the committee, this meant long hours of reading, analyzing and agonizing. Each nominee was given a score, and the scores tallied in a database. The first round reduced the list to eight poets, which was then whittled down to only three — a heartbreaking task. Those three names were forwarded to Governor Pawlenty, who made the final selection.

Our Poet Laureate will help manifest Minnesota's treasure trove of poetry. Indeed, poetry is in good hands in Minnesota.


