## Al Dollerschell's Amazon project exceeds \$10,000


Since September, 2004, Al Dollerschell has maintained a one-man bookstore for the Rochester Friends on Amazon.com. This summer his net sales surpassed a milestone \$10,000.

Al started the enterprise when he noticed that some of the books contributed from the community were highly specific in topic and might be valuable. He explained that all book donations are first screened for possible use on the library shelves before being turned over to the Friends. Most are either placed in the Bookstore or held for our quarterly sales. When "rare or interesting" books come to the Friends, Al researches them for value and lists them on the Amazon.com web site.

He credits the educated book sorters for setting aside many of the books for possible Amazon sale. All types of books are listed, with subjects "all over the place," he says, although there is very little fiction.

Recent sales have included a picture book on Mexican costume which sold for \$599, an introduction to magnetic materials which went for \$349.95, and a book written in Croatian which was purchased by a woman in Vienna, Austria for \$82.95.

He currently has 750 titles listed. Thanks for all of your hard work, Al!
