We are delighted that Ms. Hodgson will be our guest speaker. She has been an independent journalist for 31 years, and is a member of the American Society of Journalists and Authors, Association for Death Education and Counseling, and Association of Health Care Journalists. A prolific writer, she is the author of 27 books and hundreds of print and internet articles. She is a monthly columnist for *Caregiving in America* magazine and is also an Open to Hope Website author. Her writing comes from experience and Hodgson has shared her experiences on more than 160 talk shows, including CBS Radio and WCCO,



and dozens of television stations including CNN. Her work is cited in World Who's Who of Women, Who's Who of American Women, Who's Who in America, Contemporary Authors and other directories.



Thanks for Another Successful Fall Book Sale

The Fall Book Sale on October 4 was a little different this year as we had a preview sale on Saturday, October 3 for the Minnesota Education Media Meeting attendees after their meeting at the Mayo Civic Center was finished

Sunday saw many customers who donated \$951.39 for the auditorium books and brought in \$145 for Rare and Unusual books giving us a total of \$1096.38 deposited with more to come in, so sales will total over \$1100. THANKS to the 31 volunteers who set up, restocked and repacked the books for a total of 108 hours.

The Minneapolis group, Books for the Future, took our remaining books. They sell them, and with the proceeds, buy trees for Africa. Thanks to Elizabeth Ritman for helping load the books.
