Seventy members attended the Friends Annual Meeting Luncheon January 27th. The catered luncheon consisted of chicken casserole, fruit salad, rolls and butter, with many bars and cookies provided by the Friends board. The fellowship was a time to celebrate our common commitment to the Library. The business meeting followed with the presentation of the 2009 budget of \$34,880 by Sylvie Nickel. The election of new board members for three years: Carol Mikesh and Barbara Eakins. Re-elected for three year terms were Shirley Edmonson, Theresa Friedhoff, Elizabeth Ritman, Elaine Schmidt and Joyce Wenz. Elected to one year terms are President: Shirley Edmonson, Vice President: Elizabeth Ritman, and Secretary: Dick Massaro; elected for a two year term is Treasurer: Sylvie Nickel.

Our bookstore activities for 2008 included:

- Five book sales raising \$11,128, which includes \$1300 from *Unusual and Rare Books* thanks to Sylvie Nickel and Carol Smyrk. This helps fund the **Read with Me** program at Methodist and Olmsted Hospitals, providing books to newborns in English and Spanish thanks to Pat Stephenson. We were able to have Rochester families photographed for the newest edition.
- We funded \$4500 for Adult/Youth/Children's programming, approved funding to the Library to purchase: five magazine spinners and Children's, purchased stand-up opac stations between FM&M and the circulation desk, purchased a new registration table, implemented slatwalling of an existing reference display, ex-

panded genealogy databases, purchased Rochester Reads books and supported the Summer Reading Program, and paid for a parking space for working volunteer usage.

- The books donated to the Friends contained almost \$127,000 in books that the Library could use.
- The ink cartridge-recycling program raised \$250.
- Our budget funded Books to the Troops and postage thanks to Pat Stephenon.
- Our Amazon link provided \$1,017 in commissions and online sales made \$4,476 thanks to Al Dollerschell, Pat Stephenson, Sylvie Nickel, and Carol Smyrk.
- We initiated an appreciation Breakfast for the Library Staff during National Library Week.
- We made memorial contributions to the Library Foundation for Gil Brown and Jan Karlson.

The 370 Friends volunteers contributed 14,603 hours to the Library, provided 42 Library Hosts helped 793 students by means of the Homework Assistance Program.

From the Director



As Friends of the Library, you do so much for the community. You give us your time, talents, and treasures. You also a great advocates for the library as you talk to friends and neighbors about your volunteerism. Especially in tough times, people turn to the library, and you are a part of how we support the entire community.

So as you talk to your friends and neighbors, here are a few things to talk about.

Libraries are part of the solution when a community is struggling economically. During tough economic times, people turn to libraries for their incredible array of free resources, from computers to books, DVDs, and CDs, for help with a job hunt, for learning computer skills, for finding all kinds of information, or to participate in the activities of local and community organizations.

• Circulation was up 18 percent in December 2008 compared to December 2007 at RPL.

Libraries help level the playing field for those in the community who can't afford to pay for information or access to technology. (Public libraries are the number one point of online access for people without Internet connections at home, school or work>) In a world where knowledge is power, libraries make everyone more powerful. Libraries offer free access to all; they bring opportunity to all. Examples:

- Some businesses only take online applications. Many come to the library to apply for jobs using our free high speed internet computers. (Only 44 percent of the top 100 U.S. retailers accepted instore paper applications in 2006.)
- Many come to read classified ads in our newspapers.
- Many come to check out materials when in the past they may have bought them.
- Some type resumes on our word processing computers and print their resumes on our laser printer.

Public libraries are there to support learners at every age. As schools cut their budgets students look for support in other places. Examples at the Rochester Public Library:

• Homework assistance is also available for free

from the Rochester Public Library. Whether the student comes in to work with community volunteers three nights a week or uses the online tutoring program, Live Homework from Tutor.com, from computer, the student receives help.

- Practice ACT, SAT, etc. tests and study guides.
- General resources to help in student research.
- Early literacy support from infant to preschooler through materials and storytime kits for parents and daycare providers.

Your ability to get information shouldn't depend on your ability to pay for it. Reference librarians in the nation's public and academic libraries answer more than 7.2 million questions weekly.

There are more public libraries than McDonald's in the U.S.—a total of 16,549, including branches.

The national average annual cost to the taxpayer for access to this wide range of resources is about \$31, the cost of one hardcover book. Libraries are among the most effective of all public services, serving more than two thirds of the public with less than two percent of all tax dollars.

Americans spend more than twice as much on salty snacks as they do on public libraries.

Thank you so much for all you do. You make Rochester and Olmsted County a better place to be, especially in financial hard times.

Friends' Bookstore News




2008 was a great year for the bookstore and our wonderful volunteers are the ones to be congratulated for
