HOURS: CHANGING ACCESS, 25 YEARS LATER

When is the library open?

Throughout the last year, our hours of operation have changed many times in response to the COVID pandemic.

The 2021 summer hours are the highest they've ever been, with our doors open 64 hours each week. Pre-pandemic, Rochester Public Library (RPL) was only open 58 hours a week during the summer months.

The current schedule (Monday-Thursday, 10AM-8PM and Friday-Sunday, 10AM-6PM) is a temporary solution.

"We know that, post-COVID, our community needs may be different," explains Library Director Audrey Betcher. "Now is our chance to take a fresh look at everything, including hours."

The discussion isn't one that Betcher is taking lightly. "We have to balance community available need with resources, such as the cost of staffing and 'keeping the lights on."

The conversation is reminiscent of one held almost 30 years ago, when RPL was preparing to move into a new building. Notes from a 1993 Library Board meeting describe the board's Policy Committee asking "Do you think the addition of up to four hours each Sunday should be a high priority as we prepare the staff budget for 1995?"

Back then, the board voted to research the question with a community-wide survey initiated three years later.

LONGTIME DIRECTOR ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

After more than two decades at the helm of Rochester Public Library, Director Audrey Betcher has announced her retirement.

Betcher broke the news in July, almost 25 years after joining the RPL team, with 21 of those years spent leading the organization. She says the pandemic gave her a new perspective on what she wants to do in the coming years. "I'm ready to spend time with family and friends, and do more traveling and exploring," she says, adding, "I also have a few volunteer opportunities to keep me busy."

While working her full-time job, Betcher has been serving as a tutor with the Rochester Reading Champions program and as President of her Rotary Club.

Library Board President Antinea Ascione says Betcher is credited with guiding the library through significant changes over the last few years, earning the organization local, state, and national recognition. "Audrey is committed to serving the community by listening, learning, and taking action, all while keeping her large team focused on the overall library mission," explains Ascione.

When Betcher started at RPL as the Assistant Director in August of 1996, libraries across the nation were grappling with how technology might change community needs. According to Betcher, "We were still loaning out VHS tapes, audio cassettes, and vinyl records in 1996."



As the library's collection changed, so did the organization's role in the community. "Libraries were primarily focused on being repositories for books in the 1990s," says Betcher. "We know today's library serves a much broader purpose as a community gathering space and connector of people."

According to City Administrator Alison Zelms, Betcher has been a key collaborator bringing cohesion to the city leadership team. "While I've only had the last six months to work with her, it's clear that Audrey's commitment to serving the community has benefited the city. Her dedication to listening to community members and working with community partners has provided valuable insight to the leadership team," says Zelms, adding, "Her forward-thinking energy has been incredibly helpful in evolving relationships to assure continuous improvement, that embraces change, values innovation, and relies on teamwork to guarantee success reaches beyond the walls of the Library and across the city organization."

At the time, being open on Sundays was a newer trend for libraries. In the 1996 survey, participants were asked to rank the importance of library services in relation to funding. Sunday hours ranked higher than children's programs and school visits, reserve services, and the internet.

Fast-forward more than two decades: the Library Board has directed staff to examine the library's hours once again. According to Board President Antinea Ascione, the impetus this time is simple: it's about equity. "Prior to the pandemic, we had just completed our strategic planning process. Rochester residents affirmed our decision to center equity and inclusion," explains Ascione. "Our long-term hours of operation is just

one area that we're reexamining, so we can ensure that our entire community has the access they need." This time around, library staff are working with the Diversity Council in Rochester to host focus groups and conduct a new survey.

Says Ascione, "We don't want to just pick new hours, we want to have community members to weigh in on the best path forward." As was the case in the early 1990s, budget constraints will still play a role in hours of operation. Leadership will also be reviewing the bus schedules, school hours, and other factors. The survey and other research will wrap up during the fall, with a decision about long-term hours expected at the beginning of 2022.

SIDEWALK SALES **HELP FRIENDS' WITH** INVENTORY BACKLOAD

A huge thank you to the volunteers who have been helping with and the customers who have been shopping at the Friends' sidewalk sales! This past May, as Olmsted County started reopening, the Friends borrowed an idea from other Friends' groups to plan themed summer sidewalk sales. The pilot "Road Trip" sale featured non-print items - audio books, music CDs and DVDs - and generated over \$600 in sales. The next two sales, "Father's Day" and "Back-to-School" generated \$1100 each. At press time, a "belated Mother's Day" sale was planned for August 13 & 14.

The income from these sales supports the Friends' mission of expanding the library's resources and supporting special projects. That is important since, like so many other organizations and events, they have been impacted by the pandemic. The Friends' Bookstore had to be closed and the auditorium sales cancelled. Additionally, the annual membership drive did not take place because Friends' members could not take advantage of their discount in the Friends' Bookstore or early admission to the auditorium sales. All memberships expiring in 2020 were extended, and now expire 12/31/2021.

Without their normal sales channels to move books out the door and with limited storage space at



the Library, additional donations still cannot be accepted. Work is ongoing to evaluate how the Friends' Bookstore can safely re-open, and when donations can again be accepted from the general Please watch the library website and Facebook (both the Library's & Friends') for more information as it becomes available.


These new titles may have fallen off your radar this past year, but they're all worthy of adding to your to-be-read list.

by Brit Bennett


The Vignes sisters, Stella and Desiree, are identical twins growing up black in Louisana in the Jim Crow era. Together they escape their small hometown for New Orleans but Stella disappears one night without a trace. Fourteen years later, in 1968, Desiree is back in their hometown raising her daughter, Jude. Jude also dreams of leaving small town life and heads west to UCLA. There she spots a woman who looks exactly like her mother, except this woman is white. Bennett follows up her award-winning debut *The Mothers* with an engaging, interwoven story of a family dealing with racism, colorism, and sexism over several generations.

Kevin Kwan is the author of the hugely popular Crazy Rich Asians trilogy and his most recent book has all the same elements that made them popular – love, money, and drama. Lucie Churchill is the daughter of a Chinese-American mother and wealthy blue-blood New York father. After meeting George Zao at an opulent wedding on Capri, they have a brief romance. 

COMING SOON: NEW APP FOR FINDING BOOKS, OTHER RESOURCES

The library will soon bring the browsing experience to a new (digital) level.

Expected to launch later this year, the Rochester Public Library app will allow customers a better way to browse the library collection on mobile devices.

Despite having a completely redesigned website, the library's online catalog has remained relatively unchanged. RPL's Information Technology Services Manager, Steve Mosing, says the new RPLMN Mobile app will offer a completely new experience.

"Similar to what other industries are doing, the library will launch this new app to make it easier to see what we have available in our collection," explains Mosing. "The user interface is intuitive, making it easier for people to find books, DVDs, and audiobooks."

RPL currently offers this type of experience for the digital-only collection through the Libby app. Says Mosing, "People really find apps to be much more user-friendly. They tend to process information faster and allow for greater interactivity, which makes the entire experience better. Users save their library card number and pickup location, and limit searches to more easily find what they want."
