

Connected Chromebook Program brings "critical access" to those in need

In September, RPL received a grant for \$619,000 to purchase Chromebooks with data connectivity as part of the Emergency Connectivity Fund Program from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). Federal officials say the program helps close the digital divide.

According to Library Director Audrey Betcher, RPL purchased a total of 1,000 Chromebooks with built-in internet access. "These devices provide crucial internet service to families and individuals who need to connect with online educational resources."

For the first round of Chromebook distribution, RPL partnered with local organizations to identify those needing critical online access. "We launched this program first with non-profits, government agencies, and schools who helped identify individuals who need access," explains Betcher, "And in November, we started offering them more widely."

The devices are checked out to Olmsted County residents who qualify, with a due date of June 30, 2022.

"In talking with individuals, we realized longer-term checkouts are necessary for people who need the access for learning," explains Betcher.

RPL is one of a few hundred libraries throughout the U.S. to offer this type of program. To make it happen, dozens of library teammates pitched in to unpack, label, and package the devices. In all, the 1,000 Chromebooks were ordered, delivered, and processed in less than a month.

Keri Ostby, Head of Technical Services, says previous experience with other large-scale projects helped her team create an efficient assembly line before the devices arrived. "We started thinking about the processing part of the project during the grant application process," explains Ostby.

Hours survey wraps up, research continues

Over 3,000 Rochester-area community members participated in the library's Hours Survey, surpassing previous numbers for library surveys.

"People really care about when the library or bookmobile offer services," says Library Director Audrey Betcher, adding, "We know that we are limited in how many hours of service we can offer, so we want to make sure we make the right decision."

To get to that decision, Betcher says staff will review the 3,000+ surveys and usage patterns for the past several months. In addition, RPL is partnering with the Diversity Council to engage community members by conducting a series of individual interviews to hear from often under-represented voices.

"Listening to community voices that we don't often hear from will provide valuable insight on our service hours," explains Betcher.

As part of the Hours Research project, library staff is also reviewing bus schedules, school calendars, and other information.

Betcher says the goal is to make a recommendation to the Library Board in early 2022.

Turning trash to treasure with Greater Rochester Rotary

The library's Connected Chromebook program is providing critical connections for individuals who otherwise lack consistent internet access, but adding 1,000 Chromebooks created a lot of trash.

"Usually when an individual buys a Chromebook or other device, there's typically a lot of packaging material," says Keri Ostby, Head of Technical Services, adding, "Just imagine what that's like when you have a thousand devices."

In early October, the library added 1,000 Chromebooks to the collection for the grant-funded Connected Chromebook program. Each device and carrying case came with wrappers and foam designed to protect the items.

Ostby estimates there were a total of 6 boxes of discarded packing material weighing almost 50 pounds, something she and others feared would end up in the landfill.

That's when the Greater Rochester Rotary club filled in.

Board Member Patricia McCleese says her club also worries about plastic filling the landfill, so they found a program that uses stretchy plastic to make decking and outdoor furniture. It is called Plastic to Benches.

"We collect plastic waste –number 2 and number 4-from businesses and sort and weigh it before giving it to a distribution partner that ships the waste to Trex," explains McCleese. After sending in 500 pounds, the club earns a bench for a local non-profit. "Trex makes decking and outdoor furniture that looks like wood but is recycled plastic."

McCleese invites others to accept this challenge. "Stop using one item of plastic for a month," she





challenges, saying that when she tried it, she thought it would be simple. "I don't use that much plastic. Then I looked around and was hit with plastic overload. It is everywhere and lasts forever," she explains, adding, "Programs like Plastic to Benches are a start. Greater Rochester Rotary is initiating the program and hopes more groups will do likewise."

With the Chromebook waste from the library, there was over 49 pounds of plastic collected and saved from the landfill.

Digitization Dedication: Volunteer David Niedfeldt

Since 2019, the library has been working on a major scanning and digitalization project involving thousands of news clippings, photographs, and negatives from the Post Bulletin archives.

Librarian Susan Hansen says volunteers are making this project possible, including David Niedfeldt, who took on the role after being laid off from a previous job.

"I have an interest in archiving," explains Neidfeldt, who holds a degree in history. "This is something I am really good at and I understand that it's just one piece of something much larger."

Every week, Neidfeldt says he spends between 7–9 hours "doing my job" for the digitization project, which he says gives him the ability to use his knowledge and appreciation for archiving while also helping to build his resume.

"It's more than a volunteer position to me," says Niedfeldt.

His dedication is something Hansen appreciates, along with the support of the other volunteers working on the project. With over 465 boxes of items, Hansen says she could use more volunteers.

Prior to COVID, Hansen had ten regular volunteers helping with the project, and right now she's down to just three.

"We have thousands of articles and images dating as far back as the 1950s," explains Hansen. "It's a big project and we can really use a lot of volunteers to get it done."

While the library has hundreds of Post Bulletin newspapers available for viewing on rolls of microfilm, Hansen says it's not the easiest way to access information, nor do they produce high-quality images.



"When we wrap up this project, people will be able to easily search for information and images by using keywords," explains Hansen. "This will be a great addition to our local history digital collection."


