Book Group in a Bag

Katherine Stetcher, librarian in the Readers Services Division, created a new book group service. One of Katherine's colleagues had told her of a new service that other libraries were trying, called "Book Group in a Bag". Each kit includes 10 copies of the selected title, a reading guide including discussion questions, read alike book marks and tips on starting a book group. Katherine decided to create some kits for the Rochester Public Library. She started collecting multiple copies of popular titles from the donation bin. "I could never collect quite enough copies to put together entire kits", Katherine smiled. "Then Audrey Betcher suggested that I apply for a Minnesota Library Association Enhancement Grant. I wrote a grant application and several months later, received \$2000."

Katherine used the money to purchase copies of titles and attractive bags for toting around the book group kits. She decided which titles to create kits for by researching titles that other libraries had chosen and by completing the kits she had started from donations. She gave preference to titles available in paperback to stretch her budget. One of the RPL book groups, Literature into Film, donated 10 copies of the Hunchback of Notre Dame.

The "Book Group in a Bag" kits are a fantastic service for people who belong to a book group, or want to start one, because they take the hassle out of book groups. Members will no longer have to scramble to obtain a copy of the title of the month, and leaders will be equipped with study guides and suggested discussion questions.

There are currently 20 "Book Group in a Bag" kits available for check out. Titles include: Pride and Prejudice, Year of Wonders, Angels and Demons, Falling Angels, The Red Tent, The House of Sand and Fog, The Corrections, Cold Mountain, The Hunchback of Notre Dame, The Bean Trees, To Kill a Mockingbird, The Giver, The Life of Pi, Under the Tuscan Sun, Angela's Ashes, Shadow Baby, The Nanny Diaries, Gap Creek, Blessings, The Lovely Bones. If the kits prove popular Katherine plans to add 10 per year.

The kits can be reserved up to a year in advance and checked out for 5 weeks. To reserve a kit call the Fiction Movies and Music Desk (507) 285-8006. Carrie Farrow


