
We would like to extend thanks to the 25 volunteers who put in

RSVP is Back!

RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) is again offering those of you aged 55 or older mileage reimbursement for your volunteer activities at the library. This national program designed to encourage service in the community, is now being administered locally by Catholic Charities.

To benefit, you enroll in the program by completing an application form. These are available at the *Friends' Bookstore* or on my desk (administration office, 2nd floor). When completed, I will send them off. On my desk or in the bookstore you will find a mileage expense sheet for you to record your journeys. I submit these on a monthly basis and the payment is then mailed to you. Mileage is reimbursed at 14¢ per mile to a maximum of \$10.80 per person per month.

From the Director

The third annual Rochester Reads is underway. Rochester Reads Partners include: the Rochester Public Library, the Post Bulletin, the Adult and Family Literacy Program, Olmsted County History Center, Rochester Public Schools, Barnes & Noble Booksellers, Rochester Community and Technical College, and the Diversity Council. Rochester Reads sponsors include; *The Friends of the Rochester Public Library*, The Rochester Public School Foundation, Yaggy Colby Associates, Post-Bulletin Company, and the Rochester Public Library Foundation.

The community voted on four titles during the general election season this fall. The titles were Fahrenheit 451 by Ray Bradbury, The Giver by Lois Lowry, The Land by Mildred Taylor and White Lilacs by Carolyn Meyer. Approximately 1000 votes were cast. The vote was promoted by advertisements in the Post-Bulletin, by radio & TV interviews and displays. Community members could vote online at www.RochesterReads.org, by phone (Post-Bulletin cityline) and by ballot. Ballot boxes were displayed at the Library, the high schools, the Olmsted County History Center, Barnes and Noble Apache, University Center Rochester and the Post Bulletin.

And the winning title is... <u>The Giver!</u> I think this book is an excellent choice. I found the book very powerful. It is well written and it won the Newbery Award. It is accessible to many different ages, and I think it will generate a great deal of discussion.

Children's Librarians and school media center specialists chose children's titles that reflected the themes of <u>The Giver</u>. The youn reader selection <u>Among the Hidden</u> by Margaret Haddix is geared for readers in grades 4-7. The picture book <u>Wilfrid Gordon McDonal Partridge</u> by Mem Fox was chosen for pre-readers. We are very grateful to the *Friends* for purchasing an extra 50 copies of <u>The Giver</u> and extra copies of the children's titles too. The Rochester Public School Foundation purchased over 250 extra books for the school media centers around town too.

The title was announced by Mayor Ardel Brede on December 7th at a press conference in the city hall atrium. The public is invited to read the books and join in events and discussions during the month of February. I am delighted to announce that the author Lois Lowry has accepted our invitation to visit Rochester. She will speak at the John Marshall auditorium on May 6th at 7 pm. We are grateful to Yaggy Colby Associates for sponsoring her visit.

I am very much looking forward to the events and Lois
Lowry's visit to Rochester. In fact, I am already scheduling my
daughter, nieces, and nephews for the May author event. I
hope you join us.

News

There is a lot of good news at the Friends' Bookstore! First, I am happy to announce that Bev Reid has agreed to co-manage the store this year. Those of you who know Bev will be pleased; she is certain to do an outstanding job. We welcome her ideas and fresh point of view.

Also, in October of this year the Bookstore will mark its tenth anniversary, a major milestone. And what a success these first ten years have been! The Friends continue to bring in more donations, more new customers and, consequently, more dollars for the library each year. 2004 closed with a healthy balance in our bank account. Once again, we were able to present a check in the amount of \$40,000 to the Rochester Public Library.

Perhaps even more important than sales in the store were the donated items the library was able to add or use to replace damaged items in its collection. The estimated value of those items was \$140,992 in 2004. These included books, audio, and video items donated by members of the community. Our sorters go through these materials, identify what might possibly be useful to the library, then route them to the appropriate library staff for consideration. It is a big effort on the part of our sorters, but very rewarding.

I want to thank all of you who contribute so much of your energy to this project: store cashiers, pricers, stockers, committee members. I especially thank our many dedicated and rarely seen but truly appreciated sorters, who often come in at short notice and at all hours to dig through the unending stream of boxes of donated books in our forever overcrowded sorting area. Congratulations to all for what you have been able to accomplish!

To those of you who generously donate your levely books, as well as those of you who come regularly into our store to buy them—thank you for making us a success!






