Letter from Bob Greene

I'm so pleased that Rochester has chosen "Once Upon a Town" for its Rochester Reads celebration this year—because I can think of few places or events more worth celebrating than the North Platte Canteen, and what went on there during the years of World War II.

The selflessness and love of country shown by the people of North Platte, Nebraska, during the war was as inspiring a story as I have ever encountered. I think the reason that readers have responded so wonderfully to "Once Upon a Town" is that it is, in essence, a love story—a love story between a country and its sons. The six million servicemen greeted by that little town of 12,000 people every day and every night of the war have never forgotten the kindness they were shown. What happened at that little train station on the Nebraska plains shows us what Americans can do to help each other during the toughest times.

I'm very proud that the people of Rochester, all these years later, are honoring the story of the North Platte Canteen and what it stood for— and I know that the people of North Platte today, and the soldiers who once passed through there, will be thrilled that Rochester is doing this. I very much look forward to visiting Rochester as you read and talk about "Once Upon a Town"— and I hope you will be as moved in reading about the North Platte Canteen as I was reporting and writing about it. Thanks so much.



From the Director New On Line Catalog a big hit "They like it, they really like it!!"

The new Sirsi Unicorn Integrated Library System (ILS) was up and running on November 20, 2003. As many of you are aware, this is the first major change in our ILS software and hardware in twenty years. That's a very long time in the automation world.



Many of the improvements were behind the scenes and transparent to our patrons. One of our objectives was that the transition to the new system was to be seamless to our patrons. The thinking was that if the patrons didn't notice any changes, it would be considered a success. Well, we were wrong. Our patrons did notice the changes and they



let us know. Comments have come in from patrons about the new online catalog. Our first positive comment came less than one hour after the new catalog was put out for the public. While not

everybody was happy, many patrons used phrases like:

"much more efficient"

"makes the overall process much easier"

"I just love the look of your catalog. The information available is incredible and the format is so very easy to read"

"I just logged onto the new library catalog/information system, VERY NICE, Thanks"



One new feature the patrons like is the courtesy e-mail. When an item is within two days of being due an

e-mail automatically goes out with a reminder message. The old system was unable to send out these notices and some patrons believed the library could send out reminders but didn't because we wanted the revenue from overdue fines.

We still have some work to do and our patrons have been very forthcoming in giving suggestions. The important thing is...we listen.






