

Donor Corner Amuzing Race 2007



The first summer fund raiser for the Rochester Public Library Foundation was a resounding success! Thirty-five teams participated in the Amuzing Race that was held on Saturday, June 9. This family oriented event, based on the CBS reality show Amazing Race, started at the library with registra-

tion and orientation. Teams of up to four raced around Olmsted County for a grand prize and numerous door prizes. Teams had to solve clues and figure out where and how to find their next clue; sometimes the teams performed tasks or worked collaboratively with other teams in order to receive their next clues.

The teams received their first clue in the library auditorium and were told to hold the envelope containing the clue up above their heads so that everyone could open their clues at the same time. Promptly at 8:30 a.m. the race began. Many teams - you know who you are - raced out of the auditorium, ready to race on to the next destination. After reading the clue, those teams ran back into the library because that first clue was actually a task that had to be completed within the library before getting their next clue.

The clues directed teams to destinations all around Rochester and had them completing tasks such as finding a vehicle in the Adamson Lincoln Mercury lot by the VIN number, catching fly balls while linking arms with another team member, using a GPS to find a location in Quarry Hill Park, etc... There were fourteen legs in the race and the team that completed all of the legs first won the grand prize. The race ended at Essex Park where the teams were treated to a picnic and prizes.

Thanks to race participants, volunteers, and sponsors, the library's first summer fund raiser raised just over \$10,000 for the Rochester Public Library Foundation. The event went so well that the Foundation hopes to make this an annual summer event.

From the Director's Desk...

Automated Materials Handling

The Rochester Public Library is one of the busiest library buildings in the state of Minnesota with annual check outs at over 1.7 million items. When items come back they need to be returned to the shelves as soon as possible, so more community members can borrow them. The current system is a very manual process. Each item must be scanned into the computer so its return can be accurately noted, then sorted onto carts, put in shelving order, and finally shelved.

We are in the planning stages for installing an Automated Materials Handling (AMH) system. An AMH system uses conveyors to move items, barcode scanners to check materials in as they are returned, and diverters to sort the materials into bins or carts based on type of material and shelving location. We anticipate that the AMH will improve the efficiencies of the system by eliminating two manual steps from the current process.

Our goal is to increase customer satisfaction without increasing staff. Patrons will be pleased to have their items checked in immediately upon return, and to be able to access recently returned items more quickly. The purchase of the AMH is funded by the City of Rochester Capital Improvements Budget (CIP), and we anticipate that it will be installed early next year.



In Memory of Jerry Balm

Jerry Balm was a member of the Rochester Public Library Board of Directors, the Friends of the Rochester Public Library and a volunteer for many years. Sadly, Jerry passed away unexpectedly on May 29th in Fergus Falls, MN. Jerry served as President of the Library Board in 2006 during which time he led the library toward a greater focus on measuring the attainment of goals set forth in strategic planning. He was also a hard working dedicated volunteer who spent hours sorting donated books. Jerry was a civic minded leader involved in

many organizations, and he was always a champion of the library. His bright ideas, his dedication, and his kind & gentle spirit will be greatly missed.

Interlibrary Loans

Although the Rochester Public Library has electronic access to thousands of online journal articles through the EBSCO databases, many research journals will only permit summaries of articles on the databases. Fortunately, the library is able to obtain copies of almost any journal article through the MINITEX interlibrary loan service. MINITEX, a statewide network of libraries, conveniently offers electronic delivery of many articles directly to a patron's email account. The MINTEX webmaster recently sent us an anonymous testimonial from a grateful patron.

"As an environmental consultant I am often called upon to evaluate properties for their potential contamination. This requires knowledge of emerging and sometimes oddball research in my field. Reading research articles is often the only way to get the information I need. However, our town, Rochester, MN, lacks a 4-year university, and the interlibrary loan service provided by our public library has proven invaluable to me. On more than one occasion I have gone looking for a specific technical article and the interlibrary loan service has found it for me. Articles on plant-induced cleanup of contamination (phytoremediation), historic chemical content of pre-1970's fire extinguishers, and the historic use of chemicals at railroad maintenance facilities, to name a few topics. This most recent request had a quite astonishing turn-around-time of one day - I thought I would have to wait weeks. Thank you, thank you, thank you!"

Did You Know...?

- The first hour of parking in the City parking ramps downtown is free anytime! If you're visiting the library (or anywhere else in downtown Rochester) and leave the ramp before one hour has expired, there is no charge for parking. Also remember that you can park in the ramps or at the meters for free on weeknights after 5pm and all day on the weekends.
- All library materials (even music, videos and DVDs!) can be returned 24/7 at the drive-thru book drop located on the west side of the building. If you ever experience technical difficulties with the mechanical book drop slot, simply use the two manual slots located just to the right of the main book drop.
- Rochester Public Library currently circulates about 1.7 million items a year. When you average that out for the days and hours that the library is open, that's approximately 5,030 items/day or 527 items/hour!


Libraries Change Lives

Sit - Stay - Read




Our Sit...Stay... Read Program is coming back this August! This program allows school-age children, grades 1-6, to read aloud to one of several

Great Expectations: Learn a Test by Learning Express offers real-time practice tests for college entrance exams like the SAT, ACT, GRE, LCAT, MCAT as well as study skills testing for the GED high school standards tests. Tests are included for many other areas also: Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB), PRAXIS, Nursing Assistant, Law Enforcement, TOEFL, Citizenship. Study skills tests are available for math, writing, reading, spelling and MORE!

Invisible Man: Several genealogy databases such as HeritageQuest allow one to search for relatives in census records, county histories and a wide variety of additional lists.

Rabbit Run: Auto Repair Reference Center contains information on every major manufacturer of domestic and imported vehicles with repair manuals starting as far back as 1954.

War & Peace: Over 150 newspapers from around the world are available through Proquest.
